A Reading from The Acts of the Apostles

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for

he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.' All who heard him were amazed and said, 'Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem among those who invoked this name? And has he not come here for the purpose of bringing them bound before the chief priests?' Saul became increasingly more powerful and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Messiah. *Acts* 9:1-22

Reflection:

Today's gospel reading provides core instructions for the clergy. We see the Risen Jesus asking Peter three times whether he loves him. Each time Peter answers affirmatively, adding, 'you know that I love you'. In response Jesus commands him: 'Feed my lambs', 'Tend my sheep' and 'Feed my sheep'. Then Jesus gives him another command: 'Follow me.' Then Peter, right on cue, gives us an example of whatabouitism. Exasperatedly Jesus has to bring him back to the matter at hand: 'Follow me.'

The Very Revd Dr Andreas Loewe, Chair of the Reconciliation Working Group in the booklet writes:

As Anglican Christians we want to see Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people take their full place within our church. This means that space must be made for self-determination within the family so that decisions fit for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ways of life may be made.

The Anglican Church recognises the importance of various activities in its corporate life through the identification of people tasked with responsibility to lead these works. Through the Aboriginal Council of the Anglican Province of Victoria (ACAPV) Archdeacon Glenn is leading the way to:

- Gather a Provincial Aboriginal church council (ACAPV) made up of clergy and lay leaders of the Province,
- Develop skills of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander clergy and lay leaders,
- Create a pathway for emerging Indigenous leaders within the church, and

• Provide reports and advice to the bishops of the Province to support continuing efforts in Recognition, Reception, Formation and Self-determination for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglicans within the Anglican Church. It is important that we play our part in the life of the State of Victoria and the Nation of Australia. As residents of Victoria and citizens of the state we want to be part of the conversations, preparations and agreements which are necessary as the whole nation grapples with a Treaty recognising its First People and the cost they have borne in the establishment of Australia. It is also vital that as Christians we act as God's covenant people—speaking, listening, making a way—with each other. Acting in treaty as we are Church.

Archdeacon Glenn will help us do this. As we are called to be a covenant people, those acting in treaty, it will be for the blessing of the whole church—for when one part of the Body of Christ experiences joy, every part is joyful.

The Revd Dr Tim Gaden has been appointed as Rector for the Parish of Maffra initially at a 0.6 fraction, **allowing him to continue his ministry at the Cathedral until the end of the year**, and as Ministry Wellbeing and Development (MWD) Coordinator. Tim's Induction is likely to be in late July.

With a strong education background, Tim is a gifted teacher in parish, school, and university settings, and these skills have been much appreciated by Lay Readers, EFM participants, and other Gippsland Anglicans with whom he has engaged in recent years. There is also a local connection from 'way back', as Tim explains:

"The children of clergy, people say, grow up used to moving from place to place, and sometimes develop a taste for it themselves. That's certainly true in my case. Both my parents were Anglican priests, who served in country NSW, New York, Melbourne, Adelaide, and Tasmania. My grandfather, also an Anglican priest, started his ministry in Sheffield in the UK but then came to Gippsland as a "Ten Pound Pom", and was briefly Vicar of Moe from 1951-52 before heading north to the Diocese of Bathurst and then further north to the Diocese of Grafton.

"I have ministered in Melbourne, London, Ballarat and the Western District, before now happily landing in Gippsland. I have been lucky enough to work in parishes, schools, universities and theological colleges. Over the years, among other things, I have tutored in philosophy at Monash University, held a postdoctoral position at King's College London, been Vicar of Battersea, the Dean (Principal) of the Theological School and College Chaplain at Trinity College in Melbourne, the Canon Theologian in the Diocese of Ballarat, Rector of Ararat, served on the ethics committees of Austin Health and Federation University, been Senior Chaplain at Ballarat Grammar School, and Chaplain here at Gippsland Grammar.

"My wife Selina and I are looking forward to becoming part of the friendly rural community in Maffra and Boisdale, something we very much enjoyed together during our years in Ararat. In addition, I am very happy to be making a contribution to the Diocese outside Maffra, continuing my current appointments as Ministry Project Officer at the Cathedral, Diocesan MWD Coordinator, and Examining Chaplain."
