So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. 'Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man.' Every day he was teaching in the temple, and at night he would go out and spend the night on the Mount of Olives, as it was called. Advent 1 Biblical Reflection – *from the Christmas Bowl resources* In the uncertainties and fragility of life, it's often hard to see where we might experience hope. In scripture we read that the Kingdom of God is near, but this becomes hard to believe when our world is so uneasy and unpredictable. When it comes to the climate, we come face to face

with the unpredictable and uncertain. Change in weather, and natural disasters, result in the destruction of homes and farmlands, leading to famine, poverty, and the displacement of communities. In these times, we may feel foolish for having hope. Luke 21 tells of a similar story of destruction and death, yet it is contrasted with a story of hope in the midst of this suffering. We are presented with a paradox, where there is pain and comfort. The Kingdom is near, and there is more at work that we do not see. Even so, Jesus asks us to stand up and lift up our heads. We are called into action. We are called to be people of hope, in times of suffering. This Advent, may we discover where we are called into action. May we ask ourselves what it is that we can do to be a source of hope in the midst of pain, by sharing what we have with others who need it, and acting for peace. *Hannah Staines*

Dean's Desk

After a beautiful Evensong with installation of canons last Sunday evening, this week started with a coffee with the CEO of Central Gippsland Health, Mark Dykgraaf, to canvass areas of overlapping interest in our community. It was great to get to know a bit more about the services CGH offers, and also to explore a couple of potential partnerships.

On Wednesday I attended an online webinar hosted by Kooyoora and featuring a presentation about developments in research around Child Sexual Abuse. The presenter shared his current research with us, the most outstanding statistic for me being the fact that all five categories of abuse have a high correlation with the children involved witnessing or being subjected to domestic violence in their early lives. I thought that was particularly relevant, given that we are currently joining with the UN and the national church in 16 Days of Activism against Domestic and Family Violence. I signed up to and am receiving a daily reflection which cites facts and figures and aims to help shift our understanding of some common myths around DV. I hope you are also joining in prayerful support for those working in this field to prevent family and domestic violence, and for people you may know who are caught up in difficult situations.

A good clutch of us trooped to the Abbey on Friday for the Advent Conversation, which as always had much pertinent input to reflect on. Also on Friday we hosted Gippsland Grammar's Choralfest here at the cathedral - a wonderful, musically delightful and deeply moving event (not least for me, given I had to do the accompaniment for Silent Night on the pedal harp, which involved actual pedal changes... Eeek! (••).

At the time of writing, Saturday holds the bishop's annual clergy and families' gathering, followed by the Christmas Parade.

What a huge week it has been! My thanks to all those who work behind the scenes to make things happen - for Evensong, for catering, for Choralfest, for the Christmas Parade...
